We have had a huge interest this year in bronze, silver and gold DofE awards and we really look forward to getting this up and running with you. Look out for letters in the next couple of weeks regarding signing up.

#### **Bronze:**

At Avonbourne Academies, we believe homework plays a vital role in providing an excellent education for all our students, bringing out the best in them and fostering independent learning. The homework programme we have developed has been carefully structured with a focus on retrieval practice that will support your son/daughter to achieve more fluent recall and mastery of their work. This academic year we are utilising a variety of online platforms, including Sparx Reader, Bedrock Vocabulary, Sparx Maths and SENECA.

Avonbourne students have worked incredibly hard over this first half-term to submit their homework on time and complete it to a high standard. We are very proud of all their efforts across all year groups and all homework platforms! Homework clubs at break and lunch have been extremely well-attended every day and have supported our students to complete their homework to the best of their ability. Our after-school homework clubs on a Wednesday and Thursday have also been extremely popular and have provided students with the space and support to complete their homework successfully.

### **Sparx Reader (Year 7)**

Sparx Reader offers an array of exciting texts across multiple genres to engage readers with a variety of interests. Sparx is always set on a Monday and due the following Monday giving students some autonomy around when and where they complete it. The highest number of words read by a single student this term is a fabulous 109,232 in just five weeks – an utterly amazing achievement.

### Bedrock (Years 8-9)

Bedrock vocabulary is an adaptive app which supports individual student ability; it also offers some EAL support for those students which have English as a second, or third, language. The texts are hugely varied and very engaging: from Alan Turing's life, to the tombs and emperors of Ancient Egypt; from Henry VIII's six wives, to the life cycle of a flamingo – Bedrock has it all! We reward 30 completion points, or an hour's homework, to acknowledge the resilience of our students. Again, homework is set Monday to Monday to allow students to choose the best time to suit their home life.

Year11 students have been carrying out homework on the SENECA platform with a particular focus on Paper 1 content that they will need to know for their November mocks. Over the half term they will have a selection of exam practice questions from biology, chemistry and physics paper 1.

In the coming term Year 11 students will still have access to SENECA but homework will be set in a homework booklet that will focus on exam skills to prepare them for their final "race" in June 2024.



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This first part of the Autumn term careers at Avonbourne has experienced three exciting trips.

We took a small group of year 11 students on an exciting manufacturing experience day at LUSH. Students made bath bombs, soaps and face masks and heard about LUSH's apprenticeship opportunities and the variety of roles that are possible within the industry









Avonbourne Girls' students were also invited to JP Morgan's inspirational speaker event. The weather was kind to us on the walk and the students were impressed with the size and scale of offices that are so close to the school. The group heard from Preet Chandi, 'Polar Preet' and her two expeditions to the South Pole, with an inspirational message that we can achieve anything if we put our minds to it.

We also continued to build on our local networks and took a visit to the Digital Skills Hub at the Royal Arcade in Boscombe. Students took part in a small workshop orientated around futures and positive mindsets.

Our year 11 students continue to have their one-toone careers appointments, these are vital discussions to plan for and prepare for next steps after their GCSE's.





### Key Stage 3 – Year 7, 8 and 9

We have been extremely impressed with Year 7 as they have stepped up to KS3 English with determination and enthusiasm. They have embraced the world of the brilliant Bronte sisters and have enjoyed applying their knowledge of context to their own writing. Year 8 and 9 have been analysing powerful poetry from several cultures, themes and styles. Additionally, these students have been using Bedrock Learning, our homework platform, to extend their vocabulary. It has been a pleasure to witness how many students are applying this new vocabulary to their own writing and developing an academic style.

### Key Stage 4 – Year 10

This half term Year 10 have been transported to the Jacobean era to become the analytical audience of the renowned 'Scottish Play'. Y10 begin the GCSE programme of study with Macbeth because it is a play which explores morality and the supernatural and opens students minds to a world of the past where the 'divine rights of Kings' meant consequences for sinners and the duplicity in humanity means we are all susceptible to evil.

Year 10 have actively delved into the text, tracking themes and motifs and exploding quotations before mastering their skills in writing extended responses. We can see some fantastic examples of essay plans.

In addition, for home learning, Year 10 have been strengthening their essay planning and writing skills and through some academic and critical reading, they have deepened their knowledge and understanding of the Jacobean world. Macbeth can currently be seen on stage at The Globe. There's not long left so go along if you can:



Next half term, we will move onto studying the famous Dickensian classic, A Christmas Carol. Students will explore the morality of the Victorian Era and the plight of philanthropists such as Dickens in striving for the fair treatment of the poor. All this wrapped up and a ghostly tale of memory, loss and redemption!

### Key Stage 4 – Year 11

Year 11 are working exceptionally hard in preparation for the first round of mock exams in November, so far, they have revisited the Literature set texts: Macbeth, A Christmas Carol, An Inspector Calls and the Conflict Poetry Anthology and finally a variety of unseen poetry. They have been revising Big Ideas, selecting key moments and quotes and essay planning in exams. As their preparation continues, they will move their revision focus to the two Language papers, developing their reading and analysis skills and mastering their writing of both fiction and nonO fiction.

Homework in Year 11 has been supportive of this preparation in class. Students have worked on essay planning and essay writing structures and skills, such as thesis statements and analytical paragraphs. Next half term, the revision will continue, and the results of the mock exams will inform students and teachers of more targeted revision areas.

### Key Stage 5 – Year 12 and Year 13

In KS5 English Literature, our year 12 students are currently studying Frankenstein. Building on themes foregrounded in their GCSE text Macbeth, such as ambition and human pride, Frankenstein explores ethical dilemmas and delves into the consequences of scientific ambition and moral responsibility. These are themes which are hugely relevant in the modern day too, with the continual rise of technological and the pressure to make scientific progress. We have begun introducing psychoanalytical readings of the text and students are learning how to adeptly discuss the ways in which Frankenstein is a study in human psychology and the human condition. Our year 12 students readily debate and discuss in class and have started writing meaningful essays, ready for our study of The Handmaid's Tale after half term, which will be compared with Frankenstein.

In year 13, Mishka is juggling revision, whilst studying Othello, the last of the new content on the A-Level course and finishing off her coursework. Whilst consolidating her skills from the previous year, studying Othello will also present a new challenge as this question on the Drama Paper requires Mishka to integrate critical perspectives into her essays. Mishka has embraced this, seeking out critical essays for all the set texts, building her confidence in exploring multiple perspectives into her own writing.

### Media Studies

There has never been a better time to take Media at Avonbourne! With four full KS4 classes and an all-high time enrolment at A-Level. With a completely refreshed curriculum, students will endeavour to critically evaluate the influence of some of the most modern array of media to date. In their lessons, students will compare modern representations of women in Taylor Swift's and Justin Bieber's music videos, and the cultural importance of sit-coms like 'Friends' and 'Modern Family'.

With our first sixth form open evening of the year completed, interest in Media at A-Level is already rapidly increasing, with the potential to beat the number of pupils enrolled for a second year running. Prospective students from all over the BCP area, with aspirations ranging from journalism, photography and film directing came to see what Avonbourne could offer them towards achieving their goals.


Currently, our Year 11 students are steadily progressing through the design process of their NEA coursework. With the option to borrow cameras, and access to the industry standard Adobe Suite students can create a range of media products from fashion magazines, music videos and wildlife websites.

Next term, our newest Year 10 cohort will be diving into developing their practical skills through camera workshops and photoshop tutorials. Which will allow them to create their first practical piece of work of the year in the form of filming the opening sequence to a teen drama!





### **Religious Studies**



This term has seen the continued, highly successful introduction of the United Learning Religious Education curriculum into Year 9. Having studied Philosophy, students in Year 9 are now being introduced to Ethics, where they have learnt accessible normative ethical theories, such as Natural Law and Situation Ethics and how to evaluate their strengths and weaknesses. Students have also analysed the influence of Christianity on the development and application of these normative ethical theories. After half term they will be studying Applied Ethics, focusing on Medical Ethics, before applying the normative ethical theories to each moral dilemma.

The RE department has continued to welcome the local Christian charity, 'The Pace Trust', into Year 7 lessons and the Wednesday Lunchtime club, 'Big Questions.' Welcoming Christians and non-Christians alike, 'Big Questions' offers students the opportunity to approach moral and ethical issues and perspectives of their own choosing, which may be different to those that they encounter within the Religious Education curriculum. This term, students have been discussing topical issues such as 'Will people ever live on Mars?', 'Why do people love/hate change?', 'Is it ever right to kill someone?', 'Is Earth overcrowded?' and 'Is sneezing contagious?' Through the structure of a debate, our students have learnt to confidently express their own personal viewpoints and engage critically with the opinions of their peers. The success of Big Questions has been shown through the uptake of its regular contributors in both GCSE RE and Philosophy and Ethics A Level.

The Prayer Room continues to be a great success, giving students and staff access to a quiet and private space where they will be able to reflect and engage with their own faith and worldview in an appropriate time and manner of their choice. Finally, huge congratulations to Louis G and Maja M for gaining the most Reach Points in Religious Education this term.


















# HOUSE UPDATES






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### **Reach Rewards Update**




# Happy Diwali!
