# Food Champion Update

The School Food Champions have spent the last term getting a broader understanding of healthy eating and exploring the social injustices around access to food. We have been looking at examples of great practice in terms of school and coming up with some different ways that we can improve the access to healthy food within our school. We are currently conducting an audit of our canteens to gather some data on what foods are currently on offer and identifying a place where we can make a positive change. Over the next term we will be carrying out a small project with the catering manager to trial out a change in the canteen and then evaluating its impact. If it is a success, then this is something that we hope to roll out permanently in out the Autumn term.









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# **Eco-Committee Update**





### Commitment to our environment

The Eco Committee made the most of the glorious weather during a field trip to BCP's new Environmental Hub near Durley Chine on the Bournemouth seafront. Since opening its doors in February this year, BCP has had an increased focus on sustainability and locality: offering seafront-made cakes and sandwiches with ingredients from local vendors, promoting no plastic waste in its food and drink options (no more sauce sachets nor ice cream wrappers!) and presenting five-star views of the 2023 Blue Flag awarded Durley Chine beach — all tucked away under a living roof made from repurposed Bournemouth beach groyne wood.

The Eco Committee are proud to have been the first visiting school group to the Environmental Hub, and they took their role seriously: posing questions at every step of their tour – led by the BCP Seafront manager, Mr Andrew Brown, who is responsible for 14 miles of waterfront: from Christchurch Quay to Poole Quay. Mr Brown has invited the Eco Committee to now consider how to make the best use of the space as its name suggests, the Environmental Hub; to say the least, this motivated mix of students have risen to the challenge by already collaborating and collating their ideas, which is expected to be a regular talking point in the weekly Thursday lunchtime meetings.

If you have not had a chance to join yet, please do; Eco Committee is open to all year groups from Y7 through to USF. Bring your lunch and drink to AG22 every Thursday, so we can all do our part to better our Earth. Remember, there's no Planet B!



This half term we have held a fantastic workshop for some of our year 10 students who are thinking about a career in the health care industry. The session was an interactive workshop and we welcomed two nurses who shared their experiences of working in the NHS and the amazing work that they do.

Year 10 one to one career appointments are well underway. All year 10 students will receive a one-to-one appointment with a careers advisor in which they can discuss their post 16 options and start to think about career research and future pathways.

After half term we will welcome a STEM roadshow for our year 8 students delivered in collaboration with BAE Systems, the RAF and the Royal Navy education programme. This year's theme is all about space. And finally, at the end of June we will be running an employer meet and greet event for our year 9 students. Students will experience a mock interview process with our volunteers from external businesses and organisations. The careers hub is really excited about this experience as it will provide excellent first-hand experience of an interview process, the types of questions that may be asked during an interview and how to conduct yourself in a formal setting.

# History

It has been another busy term in the history department as we gear up to exams in all year groups. All students are being fully supported with revision guides and revision sessions.

This half term students have been studying:

- Year 7: Challenges to Medieval Monarchs- considering what the biggest challenge monarchs faced was, including the 1290 Edict of Expulsion, the Black Death and the Peasants' Revolt.
- Year 8: The British Empire- discovering how different people experienced the British Empire, focusing on India, Africa, Canada and Australia.
- Year 9: The Holocaust-learning about why and how the Holocaust happened.
- Year 10: The Rise of the Nazis- looking at why and how Hitler came to power and how he consolidated his rule.
- Year 11: are busy revising for their upcoming GCSE exams. They have worked very hard over the year and attendance has been very positive at the Final Countdown sessions.
- Year 12: have enjoyed studying the rule of Brezhnev in Soviet Russia and social and cultural changes in Mao's China.

Extra-curricular: In the fortnightly KS3 history club students have been seeking answers to big questions with Mr Storey around climate change. The Berlin Trip 2023 has been launched for the Class of 2026 and we are looking forward to taking 77 students in October. The history library continues to be very popular, and students can borrow from a vast range of title available from their history teacher. The history department continues to be very active on Instagram and now has over 400 followers - check us out for daily stories around on this day in history, local history, key messages, and anything else that we think our community will find interesting!





# MATHS

Over 120 students in Year 7 and 8 took part in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge this term. This is a national competition that looks to extend students mathematical thinking and problem solving beyond their usual curriculum. Our students achieved some fantastic results with 4 Gold awards, 17 Silver and 44 Bronze! Over 700,000 students nationally entered the competition and only the top 8% get a gold, the next 16% get silver and you need to be better than half of those who enter to get a bronze. These results represent an amazing achievement for our students, and we are very proud of them.

Gold awards went to Olivia, Enzo and Charlie in Year 7 and Spencer in Year 8. Olivia was the top scorer in the Academies with a score of 89! We will be looking to build on this success with the Maths Challenge next year.




# **HOUSE UPDATES**

Currently we are only just in front with a few points keeping us safe. This means we could be lifting the house shield at the end of the year if our hard work continues.



## **BROWNSEA**

Furthermore, this is shown all around the Academies, as since coming back from half term, as a house we have been one of, if not the highest REACH achieving house.

On the 3rd, 4th and 5th May we held 4 separate House events in school, including a school quiz, a penalty shoot-out, a cake sale, and a basketball challenge. 


### Miss Jupe - Head of Year 8 (Class of 2028)


### Mr Ryan - Head of Year 9 (Class of 2027)


