As we approach the end of the spring term, I would like to thank students, staff, parents and friends of Avonbourne for their continued support.

We are #AVBProud of all of our students, especially those who performed in our Spring Concert Showcase at Avonwood last week. We are celebrating students' success this week in our reward assemblies and our Respect REACH event on Friday.

Next half term we are excited to launch our new House system as part of our focus on our REACH value of Community. Our new House system will enable us to create further opportunities to promote our students' personal development, celebrate their REACH values and recognise their achievements both as individuals and as teams. Students will participate in a wide range of events and activities as part of their House which will fall under the following categories:

- Competition Healthy rivalry between Houses and trying new things.
 - Outreach Living our values and raising money for charities.
- Community Bringing the Houses together for events and fostering a sense of belonging.

All students will randomly be assigned a House and will be organised into smaller tutor groups within each House. At Avonbourne we appreciate and value cultural and religious diversity, that's why we are celebrating the holy month of Ramadan together with our Muslim community. Ramadan is the ninth month in the Islamic calendar. It is a 29-30-day period of prayer, fasting, self-control, charity-giving and goodwill to others. Fasting during Ramadan (which includes drinking no water), is one of the Five Pillars (fundamental religious duties) of Islam. Those fasting are recommended to have one meal (suhur) just before sunrise and an evening meal (iftar) after sunset during Ramadan. Muslims are encouraged to think of cleansing the whole self, through prayer and reflection throughout the day which can have a positive impact on individuals. familial and wider social relations.

To support our fasting students, we are providing them with a supervised, quiet place to rest during break and lunch throughout the month of Ramadan.

Wellbeing

The Wellbeing Hub is thriving this term. We have more groups and more staff. than ever before! This term we have two new members of staff in the Wellbeing Hub.

Ms. Brancaleone is our ELSA. An ELSA is an Emotional Literacy Support Assistant: Alicia supports students and gives them skills to be able to communicate their emotions effectively in one to one and group sessions. Sessions cover social skills, emotions, bereavement, social stories and therapeutic stories, anger management, self-esteem, counselling skills such as solution focus and friendship.

ELSA groups include-

Controlling my Thunder: 6 support sessions run by ELSA's. This intervention involves giving the young person help to understand what anger is, what anger feels like, and identifying specific triggers. Students learn how to understand their emotions, reduce general levels of stress and use techniques for relaxing in triggering situations. Students are encouraged to use their relaxation techniques between sessions in order to evaluate their effectiveness within sessions.

Overwhelming Emotions: 6 sessions for students who struggle to regulate their emotions. Sessions include 1. communication 2. Self-esteem and confidence 3. Negative automatic thoughts 4. CBT basics thought challenge 5. Accountability.

Choices for my future: 6 sessions with a small group of students exploring how the choices you make today impact you in the future. For students who maybe at risk of multiple inclusions. It is an emotional literacy course that encourages young people to engage and be motivated in school. It helps link feelings, thinking and behaviour; stress management in the classroom and links current behaviour to future opportunities. This includes group discussions, workbook work and watching real life examples of barriers followed by success.

Ms. Rossi our school counsellor, helps students discuss their problems, thoughts and feelings in a confidential setting. Ms. Rossi works with students one-to-one, usually for 6 sessions over 6 weeks. Ms. Rossi also runs therapy groups; body-confidence, healthy relationships, resilience, anxiety and depression.



UPDATE

The year 9 students completing their bronze award have made an excellent start to their physical, skill and volunteering sections. It is so great to see so many students offering to volunteer at clubs and in departments around school, showing their commitment to our community. It has also been impressive to see what students get up to outside of school. Students are offering up their time litter picking, helping in local libraries, helping at sports clubs, doing charity work, amongst a whole range of other activities.

As students complete their physical, skill and volunteering sections of the award, we are gearing up to go on our practice expedition in the first week back after the Easter break! We will be heading out into the New Forest to practice our navigation skills as well as camping overnight. The 65 year 9 bronze students will be joined by the 20 students in year 10 and 6 students in Sixth Form completing their silver award too!







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Eco-Committee Update





Commitment to our environment

The school's Eco Committee have been out in force again, spades in hand, planting shrubs donated to us by the Woodland Trust. We were lucky enough to receive a further sixty free shrubs from the charity, in addition to the 15 saplings we received last academic year. These have been purposely placed across both school sites to fill gaps in hedges and provide nicer, greener spaces for our school community to enjoy.

Moreover, we are currently participating in the Great Big School Clean fortnight, beginning on the 17th March. Students from years 7, 8 and 9 have signed up to take part in litter picks on the school site, the surrounding roads, and in both local parks. It has been a pleasure to see how many students show a commitment to keeping the local area clean, tidy and free of rubbish.

The Eco Committee have also recently obtained funds for bird boxes to be placed in trees on our school field, meaning that our local birdlife has somewhere safe to nest, lay eggs, or shelter from bad weather. We hope to encourage more species onto our school site by providing these shelters.



As part of our ongoing commitment to our environment, we pledge to plant more trees, hedges and flowers around the school site, and will continue our outreach into the local community.

This week's eco-tip: Eco friendly period products

There are now a huge range of period products available which are much more environmentally friendly than traditional sanitary towels and tampons.

Medical grade silicone moon cups are a fantastic alternative to tampons as they can be washed and reused again and again, meaning that there is zero waste going to landfill. They can hold enough fluid to be worn all day without the need for visiting the toilet and are ideal for people who do not like the discomfort and bulkiness of sanitary towels.

Period pants and reusable sanitary towels are also excellent replacements for disposable alternatives. They are completely leak-proof and much more comfortable than traditional methods for those people who might not be comfortable using the moon cups.



6th to 11th March saw National Careers week celebrating careers across the country inspiring young people to explore and find out about new careers.

To mark the event Avonbourne Academy were pleased to host in collaboration with MYTIME, the young carers charity their annual careers convention. We welcomed our young carers from across the county and at Avonbourne Academies to visit exhibitors from local universities, colleges and employers including the NHS, Jimmy's Coffee and Diverse Abilities to name a few. This was an excellent opportunity for our young carers to consider what options are available to them within higher education and local employment.

This half term a group of year 10 students visited Beagle Aircraft for a manufacturing experience visit. The students were given a real insight into the work of manufacturing and CAD design within the aviation industry including finding out about the types of jobs and apprenticeships open to them.

Students were also lucky enough to go home with a mobile phone holder designed exclusively for them and a Beagle Aircraft mascot toy.









Design Technology

On March 10th 12 students from years 9 and 10 took part in the Rotary Technology Competition at Bournemouth Collegiate School. This was a day long competition against lots of other local secondary schools where students worked in teams to design and make a product to solve a problem.

We arrived in the morning and found out that the task was to design a device that would sort and count coins. Design ideas were discussed, drawn and developed before arriving at a final idea. The groups then had 3 hours to make their design. Once made, members of the Rotary visited each team to test out and mark their products. While the Avonbourne teams did not win, a fantastic day was had by all, and we are looking forward to entering again



ENGLISH

This term Year 7 have been introduced to the exciting world of Shakespeare. They have discovered the history of plays, theatre, and stage during the Elizabethan and Jacobean eras. Additionally, they have developed and extended their literary analysis skills though an in-depth study of *The Tempest*. We have been extremely proud of how well they have tackled this challenge and their commitment to reading Shakespeare within lessons.

Year 8 have continued to explore the theme of social injustice and have been enjoying Orwell's allegorical *Animal Farm*. They have been learning about how contextual factors influence a text and effect the reader while continuing to explore key ideas such as totalitarianism, socialism and communism.

Year 9 are currently studying non-fiction through a range of speeches, articles and letters centred around key contemporary world issues such as feminism, climate change and racism. They have enjoyed learning about indigenous languages and how to save native tongues from extinction. We are impressed by their passion for developing their own voices and expressing this through rhetoric.

Key Stage Four

Year 10 students have been studying J.B Priestley's wonderful *An Inspector Calls* - a morality play that denounces the hypocrisy and callousness of capitalism and argues that a just society can only be achieved if all individuals feel a sense of social responsibility.

Our very dedicated Year 11 cohort have worked extremely hard throughout their March mock series. Next, we move to complete a series of feedback-feedforward tasks to review Mock performance and revise key content ready for their summer examinations.

Key Stage Five

This term, Year 12 English Language students have been studying language diversity – how language is used to represent us and how we represent ourselves according to our gender and/or sexuality.

Reference to its history '1952' and use of noun phrase 'traditional family structure' – both in line with DM's stance Year 13 pickup pace as they finish the course and focus on developing their understanding of diversity topics as well as perfecting their exam techniques.

In A-Level English Literature, we have been studying Atwood's great *The Handmaid's Tale* – a dystopian work of speculative fiction that explores themes of subjugated women in a patriarchal society, loss of female agency and individuality, and the various means by which women resist and try to gain individuality and independence. Additionally, we have also been reading a collection of modern poems, which cover themes ranging from adolescence to automated answer phones, and from migration to motor cars. A particular favourite among students was Simon Armitage's 'Chainsaw Versus the Pampas Grass', which explores the enduring conflict between mankind and nature. We have now moved on to studying Romantic poetry by the likes of Blake, Keats and Wordsworth, and have delved into exploring the historical context of the French Revolution and Industrial Revolution to understand the poets' opposition to tyranny and oppression.

Media

Year 11 media students have had a busy term completing coursework and preparing for both the mock exams and end of course exams in May. Many students can be proud of their creative efforts with many showing both creativity as well as competence in using industry design packages such as Photoshop to help create their work. Interestingly, as Year 11 complete their coursework Year 10 students have just received their coursework briefs from the exam boards. Over the next 4 weeks they will have the time to develop their initial ideas before carrying out research into existing 'real-world' media examples. Some of the choices Year 10 students have include creating a sequence from their own teen drama; music video for an indie artist; magazine or website to promote a special interest activity; or devise and create marketing materials for their teen-focused musical or mystery movie.

MUSIC







This term has seen year 7 learn about melodies, accompaniments and structure in music by learning to play contrasting parts as ensembles. Year 8 have continued their understanding of songwriting by applying their knowledge when composing chord progressions, melodies and bass lines, and year 9 have been performing leitmotifs from film and game music alongside composing their own underscore by using pedals, ostinatos and mickey mousing devices alongside film excerpts.

At KS4 we have been working towards coursework completion with our Year 10 Vocational students completing their Unit 2 Composition NEA, our Year 10 GCSE Music students rehearsing for their milestone ensemble performances and beginning their free compositions. Finally, year 11 have finished their final GCSE Music coursework consisting of two compositions and two performances.

Many of our students have also taken part in our extracurricular opportunities this term. Highlights have included our choir performing Carl Orffs' O Fortuna at The Lighthouse in Poole alongside Magna Sinfonia and other schools across BCP. This term also ended with our Spring Showcase which was hosted at Avonwood Primary School. Performances from the music department showcased the work from choir, soul band and our GCSE Music student performances.

Looking ahead to Summer Term, year 9 students will be heading off to see Sister Act at The Mayflower on Wednesday 3rd May and our choir and selected instrumental students will be coming together to create a cluster performance at the United Learning MusicFEST event on Monday 3rd July at Fairfield Halls. Avonbourne students will perform alongside others from Avonwood, Cornerstone and Glenmoor and Winton. More information on this will follow at the beginning of Summer Term.

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



Bright and early, before the world was awake and the ground was still frosty, the year 11 Avonbourne art students gathered on the coach ready for their day trip to London. Looking forward to whatever adventures the day would bring.

There was a buzz of excitement on the coach and with good reason; London is the only 'megacity' in the UK has a very diverse culture, encompassing over 300 languages. The population of Greater London is about 9million making it Europe's third most populated city and accounting for 13.4% of the UK's population.

Our first stop was the Victoria and Albert Museum, the world's largest museum of applied art housing a permanent collection of over 2.27 million objects, artefacts and paintings. When we arrived at the V&A we split into our sub-groups and had 2 hours to freely explore the entire gallery as we pleased. Hundreds of exhibitions encompassing multiple diverse cultures such as Asia, Africa, and Europe housing everything from contemporary artworks to ancient artefacts incorporating a huge variety of media including sculptures, paintings, jewellery, drawings, glass, portraits, architecture and so much more. This gave us a very wide range of inspiration, ideas and insight into a world of art that is not always shown. It wasn't only the exhibitions in the museum that were eye catching but also the unique architecture of the museum itself.

After the V&A our driver took us on a scenic route through central London and we saw amazing characteristics of the capital. We went past Oxford Street and the incredible Harrods shop front designed by Yayoi Kasuma and entitled 'Infinite Possibility' under Hyde Park to Covent Garden where we had the opportunity to do some London shopping, have some food and enjoy a bit of the London experience before the next part of our trip.

Our next stop was the Tate Modern Gallery, this gallery has more visitors than any other gallery in the world and is one of the largest permanent exhibitions of modern and contemporary art. The Tate was a completely different experience to the V&A we had the chance to explore a more conceptual approach to art where we spent time contemplating the deeper meanings and messages in the art. Exhibitions included short films, collections, photographs, paintings and more all which utilise a range of recycled materials and everyday objects. The gallery had multiple individual rooms for each specific exhibition which allowed all focus to be drawn to that one piece, elevating its meaning. The building of the Tate Modern was originally the Bankside Power Station that was selected as the gallery site in 1994. The building has a turbine hall, 35 metres high and with the rest separated into two halves with the boiler house to the north and the switch house to the south connected by a bridge. We were allowed to explore the gallery and all the exhibitions, buy some souvenir postcards from the gift shop and take a break in the café!

After a long day out we loaded back onto the coach and drove back home passing the lively night scenes and picturesque views of the Thames showing London silhouetted by the sunset. Finally, we were delivered safely to our parents, tired but filled with food, excitement, and lots of inspiration for their sketchbooks!

Olivia (7AG4) competed at the South West Silver **Tumbling Qualification** event in Newton Abbot.


She came 2nd winning Silver which means she has qualified to the **English Tumbling** Championships in Telford in June.

Not Gonna Lie (NGL) APP

NGL is another of those 'bolt-on' apps which is designed to work alongside a major social media network. In this instance, the 'host' platforms are Instagram and Twitter – with NGL (meaning, as you may have surmised, 'Not Gonna Lie') inviting a user's friends and followers to ask them questions anonymously.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? NGL (which stands for 'Not Gonna Lie') is an app through which users share a link to their Instagram story or Twitter account, inviting their followers to give anonymous feedback. The app includes some prewritten questions (such as 'if you could change anything about me, what would it be?'), plus the option to ask followers to simply 'send me anonymous messages'. All replies go into the user's NGL inbox, with the sender remaining anonymous – although subscribers to the app can receive hints about who each message was from.

BAD WASR

ANONYMITY AND OVERSHARING

Anonymous messaging gives rise to the 'online disinhibition effect', which causes users to feel detached from their words and actions in the digital world. This can make young people in particular (as they tend to act more impulsively online) far more likely to disclose personal information on the internet, as well as making ill-advised confessions or revealing their fears and insecurities.

PROTECTION FOR BULLIES

Having their identity hidden makes bullies feel safe from repercussions, so anonymous chat sites are a major avenue for cyberbullying. NGL claims to use Al to fliter out insulting terms, but our expert sent a range of such phrases (starting with 'cow' and 'ugly', and becoming progressively more offensive) to a 'dummy' account. All of these trial messages were delivered to the recipient's inbox.

COSTLY SUBSCRIPTIONS

NGL offers a subscription where –
for a weekly fee – users can unlock
hints about who's been messaging
them, including the sender's

n June 2022, NGL had to revise its terms of service: informing users if a message was sent by the app's developers as opposed to genuine followers. It emerged that, previously, NGL's makers had attempted to boost engagement with the app (as well as enticing users to pay for subscriptions) by sending take anonymous messages from bots. This update was rolled

QUESTIONABLE SUPPORT

iGL does have a 'report this nessage' button for users to flag upsetting content. After sending a nessage, however, an automated eply arrives stating "... NGL is 100% anonymous and we have no way of nowing the identity of the user and would not be able to find out, even if we tried." This did not till our expert with confidence that the app can eddress best behaviour advantable.

ACCIDENTALLY GOING VIRAL

he messages on NGL itself are innormous, but users can share hese messages via their instagram tory or Twitter feed – enabling all heir followers (or anyone, if their accounts are set to 'public') to see hem. If a young person has lisclosed something embarrassing ir identifiable on NGL without ealising, this information has the potential to be re-shared very wickly to a for wider any lines.

DEALING WITH NEGATIVITY

Blocking another user on NGL will prevent them sending anonymous messages to your child in the short term – although a determined abuser could get around that obstacle simply by setting up a new Instagram account. If your child continually receives negative messages that upset them, it might be worth encouraging them to consider whether they really need to use the app at all.

EXPLAIN ANONYMOUS APPS

We understand that a conversation with your child about the risks of anonymous messaging may seem difficult to initiate (especially if you aren't that comfortable with using social media yourself). It is vital, however, that young people understand that, for some people, having their identity obscured online can make them feel more powerful and less accountable for their actions.

BLOCK IN-APP PURCHASES

To avoid your child running up an eye-watering bill through an NGL subscription (or indeed any kind of costly in-app purchases), go into the settings on whatever devices they use to go online and either disable the ability to make purchases or protect that function with a password. If those options aren't available, it's prudent to ensure there aren't any payment methods linked to their account.

THINK BEFORE SENDING

Regardless of whether a messaging app is anonymous or not, it's a good idea to regularly talk to your child about how it's wise to think through what they're sharing before they post it. Emphasise that nothing is truly private once it's online. If the post is something your child might hesitate to say to someone face to face, then it's probably not the sort of thing they should be writing online either.



Private Fostering

Private fostering means a child under the age of 16 (or 18 if they're disabled) is being looked after for 28 days or longer by someone who is not a close relative.

Why people choose private fostering

- children living with friends due to parental separation or divorce
- teenagers moving away from their family
- parents working unsociable hours and unable to provide ordinary day care or after-school care.

Child Employment

The Law

Children may be employed in light work from the age of 13 years old until the end of compulsory schooling. Light work means work which is not likely to be harmful to the safety, health or development of children and it is not harmful to their attendance at school.

Employers are required by law to register any child of compulsory school age who are working for them (paid or unpaid) with the Local Authority in which the child will be employed. An employer can be prosecuted for employing a child illegally. In addition, the insurance which the employer must have for his employees may not be valid.
