Careers Update

The armed forces include the British Army, Royal Air Force and Royal Navy. Together, they're responsible for the safety and security of the UK. They're involved in combat, peacekeeping, and humanitarian aid. There are hundreds of different armed forces careers. You have the chance to see the world in many jobs you can do in civilian life. For example, a chef, a nurse or an engineer. They also have lots of roles that you'll only find in the forces. These roles include tank crew or military intelligence specialists.

For some jobs, you do not need a lot of qualifications. Wherever you start, you'll have the chance to build a career, get more qualifications and move up through the ranks.

You'll have to commit to a length of service when you join. This can be from 3.5 to 6 years, depending on which of the forces you want to join. Each of the armed forces has its own careers website. You can use them to get tips on recruitment, the selection process and how to prepare.

Cadets can be a great way to get some experience while you're still in school. As a cadet, you'll show commitment to the armed forces and find out about life in the military.

The armed forces also offer sponsorships and bursaries for university students. You can apply for subjects like science, technology, engineering, Maths and healthcare. There are exciting ways to get experience of military life during your degree.

Remembrance at Avonbourne 2021

One of the most powerful moments this term was when the Academies were able to come together in the same space for the very first time. At 11am on the 11th of November students and staff descended to the large playground, wearing their poppies, for our Remembrance ceremony. Mrs Dyer led the ceremony with a short reading and Mr Kidman played the Last Post. The students were impeccable throughout, and the two minutes silence was a very poignant moment for all.

In the build-up to Remembrance Day all students had an assembly focusing on local history. The impact of war on Bournemouth in WW1 and WW2 was discussed, and students were most interested to learn that in WW1 some local hotels were used to house injured Indian soldiers and that Kings' Park was used as a parade ground. Students also learnt about two local young men who lost their lives. William Alder left a local Bournemouth school in 1915 to join the army and was killed at Ypres in 1917. Jonathon Allott also attended a local Bournemouth school and joined the army in 2008, he was sent to Afghanistan the following year. He was killed in an explosive device blast in 2009 aged 19. Students particularly remembered William Alder and Jonathon Allott in their two minutes silence this year, as well as all those who have had their lives impacted by war across the world.





A Greener Avonbourne

Avonbourne and the Eco-Schools project

This year our school has made the decision to work towards Eco-Schools Green Flag accreditation (see https://www.eco-schools.org.uk/ for more information).



Eco-Schools began in 1994 and is the largest educational programme on the planet (there are currently 70 countries delivering the Eco-Schools programme around the world), in England it is operated by the environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy. The Eco-Schools programme focuses on empowering young people to lead environmental education and action. It does this by providing a simple, seven-step framework that gives students a voice, which allows them to plan and implement environmental projects in their school, local community and beyond. There are multiple reasons we have decided to embark on the journey to Eco-Schools Green Flag. Firstly, our planet (and all life on it) is already beginning to feel the catastrophic effects of climate change, plastic pollution, biodiversity loss and a myriad of other environmental challenges. In our school we don't want our student-body to avoid, ignore, shy-away or cower from these challenges, this will not help. Instead, we want to openly discuss the problems we all face and tackle them head-on together. Through this approach, we hope to make a positive difference now, whilst empowering our students with the knowledge and skills they need to continue making a positive difference as they grow to become leaders, decision-makers, and educators themselves.

Alongside benefitting our planet, participation in the Eco-Schools programme will also benefit our school and its students. Independent research has found that student participation in the Eco-Schools programme leads to: increased confidence, development of leadership skills, improved behaviour and greater motivation — all of which are important life-skills our learners will need when they move on to further education or employment. It is also proven that Eco-Schools consume less water, use less energy and produce less waste, creating financial savings which can then be spent on additional educational resources.

You may be reading this and wondering, 'How does this impact me?' Well, our students are yet to decide on the environmental actions our school will embark on, so a detailed answer is difficult at the moment. However, over the coming months you may notice you have a son or daughter who is gradually becoming more interested in environmental issues. This interest may manifest itself in anything from an increased willingness to watch the news to regular requests for plant-based dinners. And whilst, as mentioned, it is impossible for us to say exactly how the programme will impact you, we are definitely able to say that our school is doing its very best to protect our planet, so your child can have the best possible future.

I hope you're as excited about our Eco-Schools journey as everyone at school is - if you would like to find out more, or get involved, please feel free to contact us. The school's new Eco-Committee will be chaired by two year 11 prefects – Alicia and Andre – and will be overseen by Mrs Tsabet.

We are excited to announce that we have signed up to participate in the Eco-Schools project. They provide a simple, seven-step framework that guides, empowers and motivates pupils to drive change and improve environmental awareness in their school, local community and beyond.



This newsletters' eco-tip: No more engine idling.

Leaving your car engine idling whilst you are stationary not only wastes petrol and burns up motor oil, but it is also bad for our environment. Car exhaust systems produce emissions into the air and contribute to air pollution, one of the major causes of climate change.



At Avonbourne, we want clean air for our students and for our local community, so we are asking that parents take this into consideration when dropping off and picking up students and turn off engines.

If you have an automatic start/stop engine button enabled in your car, this shuts down and restarts the internal combustion engine to reduce the amount of time the engine spends idling, thereby reducing fuel consumption and emissions, and leaving our environment cleaner.

During PSHE this half term, we have been learning about several key topics that will help our young people to stay safe, healthy, and prepared for life's challenges and opportunities.

Our year 7s have been introduced to puberty, which compliments their upcoming topics in science. As well as puberty, we have been learning about body confidence and will begin to study self-worth and body image. We look at how the media may influence body image and how people can feel confident in their bodies. Self-worth is an important aspect of puberty, as we begin to understand how the changes that happen to people are natural and normal processes.

Our Year 8s have been taking on the government! We have been studying politics and Liberties rules and laws. Next week we will be moving onto Voting and elections and Political debates. This unit falls under citizenship which is a statutory part of the curriculum and important for our students. We can get to grips with the world we live in so that our students can be an active part of the modern world and society.

Our Year 9s have been studying Rights in the community and are continuing their work on Relationship boundaries to compliment and build on knowledge form their previous topic. We begin to explore Unwanted contact from people in the community and the rights of humans. This unit has subtle links with citizenship to help build on units for year 10.

Our year 10s have been studying Friendship challenges, Gangs and crime and the dangers of Substance abuse in tutor time this term. Our students will be having a longer session on Weapons which has been created by the police outreach team 'safer schools' and will also take a further look into the dangers of substance abuse in this lesson.

Our year 11s have been studying Mental health concerns which has been designed to help support our students during the mock exam period.


From Mrs Wallace-Northridge:

It has been another successful half term in the Maths Department with Key Stage 4 students completing over 200,000 questions, totalling 37,872 learning hours on Hegarty Maths. Avonbourne Girls are currently ranked 4th and Avonbourne Boys are close on their heels ranked 6th of the 50 secondary schools within United Learning. A special mention to Kristen in year 10 who is the top performing student in the trust, completing a staggering 3730 questions since September.

Key Stage 3 have also been hard at work using Sparx Maths. A huge congratulations goes to the students in the following classes who are ranked 1st in the Trust out of 960 classes: 8AG1, 8AB3, 8AB1, 9AG1, 9AB1.

Keep up the good work everyone and remember that homework club is available every break and lunch in T3 & T4 to help you stay on track.

served as a UK Government Minister at the Ministry of Defence from 2017 to 2019.






It has been a busy first term in the Maths Department with students working hard across the academies.

The Sparx homework system is now being used across the whole of key stage 3 and is proving very successful in supporting the students learning in class. The completion rates have been steadily increasing week on week, with the girls' academy holding the top spot nationally for the XP Boost completion! I hope this will spur the boys on for the rest of the year!

We have continued to have success across Year 10 and 11 who continue to use the Hegarty Maths platform. Kristen Cheung in Year 10 had the top position nationally in the United Learning Trust for the most completed tasks above 80% success and both the boys' and girls' academies held positions in the top 5 of the United Learning league table. This effort is great to see and will pay dividends for the students as the year goes on.

In recent weeks, we have started a Maths Challenge Club in the department. This is looking at problems from the UKMT Maths Challenges and has sparked an interest in some of our key stage 3 mathematicians in exploring this fantastic subject further. Although still in its early stages, attendance has been good, and I hope that this will lead to students having the opportunity to enter the different competitions that the UKMT run later in the year.

Our PE department have been making up for lost time (due to COVID) with numerous fixtures this half term in Netball, Rugby, Basketball and Football. We have played several local schools including Bourne Academy, Glenmoor and Winton Academies, Bishop and BCS. Highlights include an incredible Year 7 rugby team who battled hard to secure a 25-15 win against BCS, a strong Year 9 Basketball team where Marcel scored several 3 pointers, a dominant Year 10 football team putting four goals past Bourne Academy and a heroic girls rugby team who not only beat our sister Academy 25-15 but scored their first try within two minutes! Well done to all students who took part in fixtures this half term. We look forward to seeing more students get involved after the break and will share the results of our Christmas Netball and Football competitions on social media this week!

In music lessons this term, year 7 have been developing their vocal performance knowledge. Most classes have achieved a whole class performance of a 4-chord mash up song in 3 or 4 parts. It has been lovely hearing the vocal talent of year 7 and discovering a few beatboxers in the year. Year 8 have been learning about chords and melodic riffs on the ukulele and year 9 have been finishing their topics on musicals with a performance of 'My Shot' from Hamilton.

We have been incredibly impressed with the work from year 8s in the lead up to their ROA performances after Christmas. All students have been working hard developing their understanding of performance techniques alongside the knowledge of melody and harmony in popular music from the 1950s and 60s.

In KS4 the year 10s have been learning about the musical elements in more detail, alongside working on their solo performance and composition skills. Year 11 have been working towards their mock listening exam and milestone performance and composition deadlines. Some of our KS4 students have been given the chance to try DJ lessons this term. This has been a great success, with many of them choosing to DJ as part of the performance element of the course. We hope to be able to offer this as a peripatetic offer very soon.



Extracurricular wise, we have all been working towards our Winter Concert. Items from Orchestra, Woodwind Ensemble, Vocal Group, Avonbourne Advanced Ensemble and solos from KS4 will features alongside performances from dance and drama.

Unfortunately, Vocal Group were unable to take part in the annual Bournemouth Schools Music Association Carol Concert this year as it was cancelled earlier in the term. However, we did submit a recording which will be streamed in the virtual concert in the last week of term on YouTube.

Looking ahead to next term we are introducing a new Music Production course to run alongside our Music Tech club. This will give our students the chance to gain a qualification and grade.

Avonbourne Advanced Ensemble are also going to be taking part in the Magna Sinfonia Platinum Jubilee Concert, performing British music alongside a semi-professional orchestra to celebrate the Queen's 70th anniversary on the throne. This will be alongside several other schools at Christchurch Priory on Saturday 12th February.

I wish you all a restful and happy Christmas break when it finally arrives.


Miss Ball – Head of Year 11 (Class of 2024)
