At Avonbourne, our aim is to teach our students powerful knowledge and ensure that the quality and rate of students' learning in all our lessons is exceptional. Teaching at Avonbourne uses evidence-based techniques and strategies that reflect developments in cognitive science, build on our students' prior knowledge and provide plenty of opportunities to practice and revisit learning. This will help to strengthen our students' long-term memory and build more fluent recall and mastery of their work.

All of the work we do around the development of teaching at Avonbourne is underpinned by two important pieces of work: Rosenshine's Principles of Instruction, an influential article based on cognitive science and research in schools, and Doug Lemov's 'Teach Like a Champion' book. These two resources have enabled us to form a common language amongst Avonbourne staff around effective teaching and support our teachers to continue to develop high-quality and effective lessons for all our students.



Avonbourne students lead the way nationally in Seneca Learning!

At the beginning of March, we relaunched Seneca Learning for all students at the Avonbourne Academies. Seneca offers high-quality free online learning courses for students to study from a computer, tablet, or phone. Seneca uses smart learning algorithms to help students remember topics better and has been proven to make students learn 2x faster. United Learning have purchased 'Seneca premium' for all students at Avonbourne.

Students across the Academies have been using Seneca during March for asynchronous lessons, homework, and for those who wish to go 'above and beyond' in their studies. Teachers are regularly setting extra assignments in Seneca for students who wish to consolidate their knowledge and strive for complete mastery of a topic they are learning in class.

45 schools within United Learning actively use Seneca. At the time of writing, Avonbourne are currently the highest performing school in United Learning nationally for the number of learning sessions, total learning time, and total learning time per active student!



Teachers at Avonbourne are busy nominating those students who are 'consistently excellent' or going 'above and beyond' for our new reward, a 'Seneca Star'. Those nominated will receive their certificate directly to their inbox at the end of March and be mentioned in their year group assembly.

We already knew that our students were extremely hard working, and now they are getting national recognition for demonstrating that 'excellence is a habit'. In Year 9, students have been talking about their local area in preparation for comparing Bournemouth and Poole to Barcelona next half term.

Our Year 11s have done us so proud with their resilience in lessons this half term. We are heading towards the finish line studying our final module on Jobs and Future Plans before preparing for in-class assessments next half term.

GEOGRAPHY

The Geography department were delighted to welcome back all our students on 8th March. Over the lockdown period we were impressed with the continued efforts and progress students were making. Since returning the interest and enthusiasm that students have displayed in their geography lessons and their thirst for understanding their place in the world has grown even more. We have seen a range of highlights across all year groups and wanted to share just a few.

Key Stage 3 Geography

Year 7 returned to their lessons to start the new topic of rivers. They are exploring the processes and landforms that can be found along river landscapes across the world. Future lessons will see them analyse the impacts that river flooding has and comparing responses based on the level of development of a country. This will enable students to apply their knowledge from studying development and increase their understanding of how a country's level of development can impact their ability to respond to natural events and disasters.


Year 8 continue to study the topic of population. Students have been finding out how the population structure of a country can affect the availability services and facilities within communities and has sparked some great conversations around this. Students' have also been analysing the impacts of both youthful and ageing populations and strategies to manage these.

Year 9 have been making great progress through their 'life in an emerging economy' topic. They continue to develop their extended answers and are honing their analytical skills. We are very proud of our student's efforts. Particular mention goes to Josh Troka, in 9B1, whose analysis of the costs and benefits of Transnational corporations was on par with a top GCSE response.

GCSE Geography

On returning back to school our GCSE students in both year 10 and 11 have showed dedication to their work. Focusing on exam practice and topic content to ensure they are best prepared for their exams.

The geography department have identified a Sophie H as a student who is working at her best. During her current topic of 'River Landscapes in the UK' she has ensured that her explanations of landform formation has included processes which are outlined and are fully sequenced. Well done.

Answer: Firstly, water crosses over abando of less, resitant rock after clowing over a band of more resistant rock. Secondly, as the river passes over the less resistant rock (e.g. shale or chalk) erosion begins to take place, this is the wearing away or material Over time, the hard rock becomes under cut and is elevated above the stream below. The river then creates a plunge pool, through the processes or hydrauic action (the force of the nater eroding material of the river bed) and abrasion the scraping of material along the river bed). Further undercutting of the overhang leaves it to become unsupported, this then collapses and gravity pulls it into the plunge pool! Overtime, the plunge pool enlarges as a result of the abrasion, from the fallen cliff Finally, over many years a steep sided garge is lest behind as the waterfall reprosts retreats upstream. This process is then repeated continually:

A-level Geography

Students in year 12 and 13 have been working diligently. Year 13 have completed their health and human rights topic, carbon topic and their NEA. Year 12 are currently completing the topics of tectonics and globalisations. All students are working exceptionally hard, and the geography team are very proud of your efforts.







The return to teaching in classrooms has been welcome for the music department. This half term we have transitioned from online virtual instruments to resume learning real ones. Students staying in their rooms means we have brought the instruments to them this year and the progress and enthusiasm has been outstanding.



This half term, year 7 have been learning about Hooks and Riffs and playing these on the brand-new glockenspiels. Year 8 have been deepening their understanding of harmony and structure through the history of pop, and are currently learning about the development of Rock music and how to play some of the famous riffs and chord progressions from Led Zeppelin and Bon Jovi on the Ukulele. Year 9 have developed their understanding of Musical theatre through performing songs from different musicals on the acoustic guitar as well as improving their diction and public speaking skills through the rap and hip hop styled musical, Hamilton.

The department have been working hard to support the return of extra-curricular music activities, choir will return as well as a new initiative to encourage music composition and performance through technology. Music Tech club will offer students the opportunity to learn to use Sound trap, a cloud-based sequencing software. They can use it from home and practice some of the techniques taught in the seminar sessions. Peripatetic lessons have begun, and student interest is increasing, keeping our new drum teacher as well as our guitar, piano, vocal, string and woodwind teachers very busy.



To encourage the uptake of traditional orchestral instrumental tuition, we are working with Sound storm, our local music hub to provide free tuition on Violin, Cello, Saxophone, Trumpet, Trombone, Flute and Clarinet. Every student in year 7 have been offered this opportunity and the response has been fantastic, we look forward to welcoming our teachers from The Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra to come and meet their new students after Easter. This will be a welcome boost to player numbers in our through-school orchestra, which will return when it is safe to begin rehearsals again.



We could not be USFprouder of our Sixth Form!

After stoically rising to the challenge of home learning for the Spring 1 term- with an incredible 40% of Sixth Formers being rewarded with Amazon vouchers for 100% live lesson attendance- it has been a real pleasure to have USF students back on campus focusing enthusiastically on their studies.

Our Year 13 submitted early UCAS entries for university courses starting in September and have successfully secured offers from an amazing 55 institutions across the UK, ranging from Aberdeen to Plymouth, from Cardiff to Kent! Many students received offers for all 5 of their choices including Russell Group universities such as Bristol, Exeter, Southampton and King's College London. The Class of 2021 continue to impress with their resilience and work ethic as they prepare for formal assessments in May as part of the grading process for A Levels.

Our Year 12 are busy preparing for their Mock UCAS exams after Easter and looking forward to the chance to demonstrate their knowledge by sitting formal exams - something this year group missed out on last summer! Looking ahead to this summer, Year 12 have secured work experience placements for July in line with their future career aspirations and we hope circumstances will permit them to explore their chosen work environment at the end of the academic year.
