### Year 9 End of Year assessments 12<sup>th</sup> – 23<sup>rd</sup> May

This Friday we will launch the Year 9 end of year assessment process to your child. These assessments will take place in English, Maths, Science, Geography, History, Religious Studies and Spanish between 12<sup>th</sup>-23<sup>rd</sup> May. Your child will come home on Friday with a support booklet that includes their exam timetable, revision strategies and a support page from each subject.

Students will be sitting their assessments for English, Maths and Science in the Roy Moore sports hall. This will mirror the exam process in Year 11, so students get used to invigilators, the expectations and getting 'exam ready'. By year 11, this process is then automatic, and students can focus on excelling in their exam. The remaining subjects will be sat in the classroom in normal lesson time. Each subject has outlined a consistent number of revision lesson(s) prior to each exam to ensure parity for all classes. Year 9 excelled in their mid-year exams and impressed everyone at the Academies. I am looking forward to the same again!

These exams are different to the previous Rank Order Assessments (ROAs) your child has sat at Avonbourne. Whilst in Key Stage 3 we use an overall rank where all subject results are combined to place students into a stream, at Key Stage 4 students are placed into attainment-related sets in their core subjects (English, Maths and Science). The results of these end of year assessments will be used to place students into attainment-related sets at the beginning of Year 10, meaning that students may be in different sets for different subjects. These are designed to ensure your child makes maximum progress and will be re-assessed throughout Years 10 and 11. Students are not generally taught in attainment-related sets in non-core subjects at Key Stage 4, unless there are multiple classes of the same subject in the same block.

We have created a blended approach to homework for Year 9 during the exam period. This means your child will have some compulsory homework to support revision, but a reduced amount to normal. This means that they have built into their homework additional revision time where they have autonomy over what to study and when.

If your child misses an assessment due to illness, there will be a catch-up opportunity in the next lesson they are back in school. These will be done in departments, which means that the next lesson in that subject will be an opportunity for them to complete the assessment.

Results will be shared through a report and celebration afternoon towards the end of June and the new classes will take place from September.

#### Wrap-around support

Every adult at the Academies will work with your child to be successful and help bring out the best in them. They have a dedicated tutor, Head of Year, two Pastoral Leads, a vast array of subject teachers, and Head of Departments. We also implement exam access arrangements for those that qualify for extra time and readers in their core exams.
